About four hundred Taylors were present at the second annual meeting of the Taylor family reunion, held at the Illinois State Fair Grounds August 29. There were six generations of the Taylor family represented at the fair grounds and the meeting proved to be one of the most successful reunions ever held in the state of Illinois.

“Uncle Foster” Taylor, living head of six generations of the John Taylor family, was present at the reunion, having come to this city from his home in Maryville, Mo. He is 76 years old. In spite of his old age he came to this city to see his relatives at the fair grounds. The oldest lady present was Mrs. Nancy Broughton aged 75 years.

The six generations of the family assembled at the fair grounds yesterday morning and the entire day was spent at the grounds. At noon the ladies prepared the table in the big dining hall and in a few moments the hall was the scene of hundreds of baskets. “Uncle Foster” Taylor presided at the head of the table. Following the dinner, “Uncle Foster” Taylor, Senator L. L. Taylor, of Centerville, Iowa, and Prof. I. Edward Taylor of this city delivered splendid addresses, telling of the family history to the hundreds of

Taylor. Phil Atterberry of Atlanta, Mo., also addressed the members of the family.

Following the speaking, the election of officers was held. The following officers were elected: Pres. David A. Taylor, Gibson, City; Vice-Pres. Senator L. L. Taylor, Centerville, Iowa, Treas., Prof. J. Edward Taylor of this city, and Roscoe Taylor of this city as Secretary. All of the officers were unanimously elected.

Members of the Taylor family belonging to the "Booster" committee were largely responsible for the splendid attendance. The committee was named at the last Taylor reunion, held in this city last year at Washington park. All during the past year the members of the committee have been striving to get as many Taylors to attend the grand reunion and their efforts met with grand success.

The "Booster" committee was composed of William Garrison, Gahlgreen, Ill.; James D. Taylor, Herrington, Kans.; Leslie Cartmell, Hazen, Ark.; F. A. Telfor, Regina, Canada; Mary J. Beggs, Moulton, Iowa; Mrs. C. W. Freeman, Springfield; Charles Taylor, Dawson, and William Taylor of Williamsville.

HISTORY OF FAMILY

All of the early history of the family has been lost, except the fact that Isaac Taylor, with his two brothers. James and William, came to Maryland, from England, in the year 1757, before the Revolutionary war. After which Isaac Taylor became separated from his brothers. Where James and William settled is unknown to the descendants of Isaac, who was the father of John Taylor whose name heads this sketch.

At the death of Isaac Taylor, John Taylor, who was born in Maryland, on May 1, 1722, headed the family, having seventeen children; of these (the youngest son,) Foster Taylor of Maryville, Mo., is surviving, being seventy six years old and was present at the reunion. He is known as Uncle Foster.

The parents of John Taylor emigrated when he

was quite young, to South Carolina, where John was married to Susan Mobley. They had seven children born there and moved in 1805 to that part of Barren county which afterward became Hart County, Kentucky, where one child was born, February 9, 1807 and Mrs. Susan Taylor, died there in the year of 1808. John Taylor was again married in 1816 to Susan Trotter. They had one child born there and moved in the year of 1818 to Wayne county, Illinois, where five children were born and from there to Sangamon county, Illinois, in May 1829, where three children were born making a total of seventeen children.

John Taylor spent six years in Sangamon County, And then moved to Moultrie County, Illinois, and in the year 1847, he settled in Davis county, Iowa. He died June 7, 1857, aged eighty-five years, one month and six days.

Of all the children of John Taylor, Simeon the oldest, James the 6th and Isaac the eighth, all by the first marriage, settled in Sangamon County. The other fourteen were Elizabeth, who moved to Wayne County, Nancy, who moved to Moultrie county, Illinois, and Mary and Ninian who remained in Hart County, Kentucky, and John M. who remained in Hart Co., Kentucky, until the year 1849 when he moved to Appanoose County, Iowa. And Harrison, Chester C., Ann, Malinda, Henry, Dennis, Lucinda and Foster who settled in Iowa. and Alvin S. who settled in Sangamon County, Illinois.

HON. L. L. TAYLOR has ably represented the third Iowa district in the state senate since first elected to that body in 1903. He has been a resident of Appanoose county for more than six decades, and has made his home in Centerville for a third of a century. His birth occurred near Mumfordsville, Hart county, KY, his parents being John M. and Nancy A. (Wilson) Taylor, who were natives of South Carolina and Virginia, respectively. His Paternal Grandparents were John and Susan (Moberly) Taylor, the former born in Maryland on 1st of May, 1772, and the latter a native of South Carolina. John Taylor was a gentleman of Scotch descent. His first wife passed away in Hart Co. Ky. in 1808, and eight years later he wedded Miss Susan Trotter, whose demise occurred in Davis Co, Iowa. He was called to his final rest on the 7th of June, 1857, in Appanoose County, at the age of 85 years, one month and six days. His first wife bore him eight children who lived to maturity, and by his second marriage there were nine, who lived to maturity. (See following pages)

L. L. TAYLOR (LEROY LEWIS) was the brother of Isaac Westerfield Taylor who is the person we are following lineage. Having traced John M. Taylor (Isaac's father) to Hart Co., KY we had run into the proverbial "wall". But with this book it has opened up the search again. We will now be able to follow Isaac on his move to Mo. and the family to Pottawattamie Co., Iowa.

... nine, who lived to maturity. William and Nancy Ann (Parks) Wilson, the maternal grandparents of our subject, were natives of Virginia, and became early settlers of Hart county, Kentucky, where both passed away. William Wilson reached the ripe old age of eighty-five years. He and his wife reared a family of five children.

John M. Taylor, the father of the Hon. L. L. Taylor, was a farmer by occupation, and also followed carpentering and contracting. When two years of age he was taken by his parents to Hart county, Kentucky, and was there reared. In 1849 he came to Appanoose county, Iowa, locating in Washington township, where he entered land from the government, developed and improved a farm and reared his family. Disposing of that property, he purchased another farm a mile and a half west, and thereon spent the remainder of his life. His demise occurred on the 14th of April, 1889, but fourteen days before his eighty-fifth birthday. His wife, who survived him for at number of years, passed away on the 2d of September, 1896, when more than eighty-five years old. Both were Baptists in religious faith. John M. Taylor held various township offices and was widely recognized as a representative and esteemed citizen of this county, within the borders of which he resided for four decades. Unto him, and his wife were born nine children, seven sons and two daughters, seven of whom grew to adult age, as follows: William J, who passed away on March 28, 1910; Holland P, whose demise occurred on the 16th of July, 1860; Lewis L. of this review; who resides near Blythedale, Harrison county, Missouri; James N., deceased; Mary Jane, who is the wife of William S Beegs and lives near Moulton, Iowa; and Nancy Alice, the deceased wife of Frank Hughes.

Lewis L. Taylor, whose name introduces this review was brought to Appanoose county when a small boy, and has resided within its borders since 1849. He was reared on, his father's farm and attended the district schools in the acquirement of an education. He began teaching when twenty years of age, and taught thirty terms of school, altogether, imparting clearly and readily to others the knowledge that he had acquired. In 1879 he was elected clerk of the district and circuit courts and held that office for four terms, or eight years. He took up his abode at Centerville in November, 1879, and has lived in the town continuously since. At the end of four terms' service as clerk of the courts he entered the First National Bank of Centerville as bookkeeper and teller, acting in the dual capacity for several years. In 1903 he was elected state senator of the third district, comprising Appanoose and Davis counties, and by reelection has been continued in that office to the present time, his record

fully justifying the confidence of his constituents and wining general approval. He held various minor offices in former years, and has long enjoyed an enviable reputation as one of the leading and valued citizens of the community. In Washington township, this county, he owns a well improved farm of one hundred and eighty acres.

On the 26th of May, 1864 Mr. Taylor was united in marriage to Miss Miriam Siler, a native of Shelby County, Illinois and a daughter of Benjamin H. and Jane (Fleming) Siler, who passed away in Davis county, Iowa, where they had established their home, in 1847. Mrs. Taylor was one of a family of six daughters and two sons, who reached mature years, the others being as follows: Lucy A., William Henry, Levi, Amanda, Joanna, Mary E. and Ellen. Unto our subject and his wife were born two children , namely: Henrietta, who was active in Sunday school and Endeavor work, and passed away at the age of thirty-four years; and John B., who wedded Miss Katharyne Eby, January 9, 1907, and is now serving his second term as county auditor. Mrs. Miriam Taylor was called to her final rest on the 30th of March, 1906, at the age of sixty-two years, one month and two days. She had long been a member of the Christian church, and her life had been in consistent harmony with its teachings. Her surviving husband has been an elder in the Central Church of Christ of Centerville for many years.

JOHN B. TAYLOR

John B. Taylor was born in Washington township, Appanoose county, Iowa, and moved with his parents to Centerville, Iowa, November 19, 1879, where he has since resided. He is a son of Senator Lewis L. Taylor and Mrs. Miriam Taylor, the latter a daughter of Benjamin H. and Jane Siler.

John B. Taylor attended the public schools of Centerville, after which he took a thorough course in the College of Pharmacy, in the Northwestern University of Chicago, Illinois. Since that time he has been engaged in the drug business until the year 1910, when he was elected to the office of county auditor of Appanoose county. He was reelected to the office at the general election, November 5, 1912.

On the 9th of January, 1907, John B. Taylor was married to Miss Katharine Eby, who was born in Moulton, this county, and is a daughter of S. J. C. and Grace Eby, whose maiden name was Grace Price. Mr. and Mrs. John B. Taylor and her parents are members of the Christian Church

JUNE 7, 1857 GATHER AT WASHINGTON PARK

Three Hundred Present – The Largest Number of Descendants of One Individual Man That Ever Gathered in the State.

TO PREPARE FAMILY HISTORY SHORTLY

Perhaps the largest gathering of the descendants of one man ever held in the state of Illinois was that held yesterday afternoon at Washington park by the descendants of John Taylor who died June 7th, 1857. At various times in the course of the day the crowd numbered from 400 to 500 descendants of the man whose memory was eulogized to the skies by his grandchildren and great-grandchildren. From all parts of Sangamon County, Taylors flocked to the park. Nor was the audience from Sangamon county alone for there were several from other parts of Central Illinois, many from Iowa and one from the state of Nebraska.

Great Dinner Served

As early as 9 o'clock yesterday morning the crowd commenced arriving at the park, and not until dark last night was the last of the number gone from the scene of the day's celebration.

At noon a dinner was served and the major part of a load of watermelons was devoured, in addition to numberless chickens, bricks of cheese, loaves of bread, gallons of pickles, shoulders and hams, innumerable cakes, pies and other eatables.

Immediately after the dinner the business meeting was held. Short talks on the history of the Taylor family were made by Senator L. L. Taylor of the Third District, Centerville, Iowa; James Taylor of Le Roy Ill., and J. Ed. Taylor of this city. Each traced the Taylor family down to the present time, and each gave a history of his own branch of the family.

The large crowd was highly interested in learning the facts of their forefathers and new history was imparted to many.

Officers Elected

In the business meeting which followed, David A. Taylor of Gibson City was unanimously elected president, to succeed Martin V. Taylor of this city. L. L. Taylor of Centerville, Iowa, was elected to succeed James Taylor of Gibson City, as vice-president, and Roscoe Taylor and J. Ed. Taylor of this city were reelected secretary and treasurer. All elections were made unanimous, no opposition being offered to any. It was decided to hold the next reunion in Springfield on the last Thursday in August 1912, at a place to be selected by the officers.

History of Family

There are probably more than one thousand members of the family descendants of John Taylor. He was born May 1st, 1772 in Maryland. Three brothers, Isaac, James and William came to America long before the revolution. Where James and William are is still unknown to the descendants. Isaac Taylor of Maryland was the father of John Taylor whose name heads this sketch.

The parents of John Taylor emigrated when he was quite young, to South Carolina where John was married to Susan Mobley. They had seven children born there and moved in 1805 to that part of Barren county which afterward became Hart county, Kentucky, where one child was born, February 9th, 1807 and Mrs. Susan Taylor died in 1808. John Taylor was again married in 1816 to Susan Trotter. This matter will be gathered and ready for reading at the next reunion at which time it will be decided as to what style of family history to have published.
